-2011 MIGRATION- RECORDS CONTINUE TO FALL!

For the third year in a row, the number of migrating birds of prey recorded during spring in Manitoba's Pembina Valley exceeded 10,000. Over 13,000 raptors passed by the count site this spring making this year's total the highest ever recorded in Manitoba. The Red-tailed Hawk was the most abundant species by far, with nearly 11,000 individuals counted.

The 2011 spring migration chronology of raptors was quite unusual. Generally by the end of March the raptor count is well into the thousands. However, at the end of the day on 31 March, only about 1,100 raptors had been seen in total. Wintry conditions in North Dakota probably held back the birds up to that

date because it was not too long after that, raptors began flooding into the valley. Within a six-day period nearly 10,000 raptors passed by the count area. One of those days was over the top with

more than 3,300 raptors counted.

Bald Eagles put in a good showing with over 1,100 counted, while Golden Eagles were down by 35 birds compared to last year when 95 were tallied. Astonishingly, Red-tailed Hawk numbers sky-rocketed in April

when nearly 97% of their total tally for this year's spring count was made. Their total count of 10,896 was the highest yet recorded in the Pembina Valley. Peregrine Falcons piqued hawk watcher's interest with seven of these rare birds passing through the valley. The Rough-legged Hawk count was up by 32 and four Swainson's Hawks made for a good seasonal count as this species is not commonly seen in the valley. Counts for most species were down, however. Notably, Turkey Vulture numbers were about 47% lower than last year's high of 190.

In 2011, counters spent about 358 h during 51 days at the count site. A Rocha thanks all who helped make this year's count a success!

RAPTOR AWARENESS DAY MARCH 31, 2012

One of next year's exciting A Rocha events will be the **Raptor Awareness Day** planned for **March 31, 2012** in **La Rivière**. This scenic hamlet is nestled in the Pembina Valley, 135 km southwest of Winnipeg. Already, various organizations have shown an interest in the event. There will be speakers, displays, a photography contest and special activities for children.

Bird tours will be available for those birders interested in seeing early migrants and those wishing to get a start on bird watching.



There will also be ample opportunity to watch for migrating hawks, eagles and falcons.

Hawk watchers will be on site to help identify the various raptors, pointing out key features to help hone visitors' raptor watching skills.

Late March is usually the peak of the raptor migration in the Pembina Valley, so come expecting to see lots of raptors and up to 14 different species of birds of prey.

By late March, spring fever should be in full swing. What better antidote than to get out and watch one of Manitoba's amazing bird migrations. Mark your calendars and plan to take part in the 2012 Raptor Awareness Day in La Rivière. Activities start at 10 AM in the Blair Morrison Memorial Hall on Broadway Street.

seeing what kind of raptor wingspan corresponded with their out-stretched arms. The students also learned about the importance of habitats and migration.

Paul and Val will continue to bring an awareness to southern Manitoba students about the importance of raptors and the role they play in the environment.

Their presentation, using raptors as examples, includes topics related to habitats, physical and behavioural adaptations, natural and human caused changes to habitats.

The presentation also introduces students to one of Manitoba's amazing local bird migrations, one which happens right in southern Manitoba's backyard. The presentation can be

adapted to meet teachers' specific teaching needs.

A Rocha's goal is to reach 500 students in the current school year.
