These encounters include summer day-camps for kids and gardening & nutrition programs for seniors, youth, newcomers & others with barriers to getting out in creation. # MISSION:

Working from a watershed perspective with an eye to the thriving of human as well as nonhuman communities, A Rocha is committed to the conservation and restoration of the natural world. We partner with local landowners, municipalities and other stewardship groups to carry out conservation science research and habitat restoration projects in BC, Manitoba and Ontario.



At A Rocha we're all about hope. But hope can be hard to find in the face of sobering environmental news -- news that has led some to despair. Our conservation work is a way of putting hope into action, whether that's studying and improving habitat for 12 nationally designated Species at Risk or training future conservation scientists through our internship program. And our work is making a difference as we are committed to the health of a particular place and its people for the long haul. In BC, for example, stretches of the Little Campbell River will now have federal protection for the Salish Sucker (an endangered fish) due to our monitoring results. And thanks to our initiative to gather agencies and stewardship groups together, multiple levels of government are taking steps towards improving water quality so that First Nations might once again harvest shellfish from their traditional feeding grounds. I am encouraged by the fruit of long-term relationships and the collaboration of so many inspired people across the country.




